



# Wildcats focus on finding identity, improving weekly

BURLINGTON — The Burlington Wildcats are gearing up for a new season of high school football with hopes of improving weekly and peaking for the playoffs.

Cody Carlson is back for a third season as the team's head coach. He will be assisted by Damon Schmidt. Jon Mariani, Dylan Wonser and Noah Nordgren.

On the field, the Wildcats return four starters on offense and seven on defense. Returning offensive starters include Alex Mautz, Logan Turner and Kaden Hawkins. Mautz and Cole, both seniors, and Turner, a junior, are all running backs who got carries the last two years after playing primarily defense. Hawkins, a junior, returns to the starting right tackle position. Also returning with starting experience is Brody Kitt, who has been a two-year starter at left tackle, where he has done a solid job, but is being moved to center following some personnel changes on offense. Kitt was the first person in Burlington school history to reach the 1,000-pound club in the strength program and has held the squat record, which he just raised to 530 pounds, since the end of his sophomore year. He has received an offer from Friends University to play collegiately.

# Pedersen steps up to coach Wildcats

BURLINGTON — The Burlington High School Wildcat cross country team is returning to the course for the 2025 season and has a new head coach leading the way.

Leah Pedersen will be the Wildcats' head coach this season. She steps up to the position after having been an assistant coach for the team for two vears. She will be assisted by Maddie Wilson and Brad Chatfield.

The team will be led by four girls and seven boys this year. Leading the girls will be senior Hattie Burgio, who qualified for state her junior season. Also projected to run at the varsity level are senior Isabella Matney, sophomore Kitana Pease and freshman Sophia Matney. Sophomore Brecken Pedersen, who missed qualifying for state his freshman season by one place, will lead the boys' team. Joining him on the varsity team are senior Logan Ferrara, junior Zach Matney, sophomores Ian Dekat and Jace Finlayson and freshmen Issac Miller and Kaden Marquardt.

Coach and team have already set some goals for 2025.

"Our goals are to grow as a team and grow as individuals learning how to push themselves and hold themselves accountable," Pedersen said.

Support will be key to the team's success in reaching the goals.

"Supporting each other in practices, school and meets will be important," Pedersen said.

and 13 assisted, as well as four tackles for a loss of yards (TFL), two forced fumbles and one interception. He was a Pioneer League All-League Second Team selection at defensive back in 2024, a three-year starter and the team's No. 1 leader, according to Carlson. McIntosh, at strongside linebacker, recorded 24 tackles, including 26 solo and eight assisted, as well as two tackles for a loss of yards and one forced fumble. Lehmann, at defensive end, tallied 55 tackles, including 38 solo and 17 assisted, as well as five sacks, 15 tackles for a loss of yards and one forced fumble. Bober, at free safety, tallied 49 tackles, including 27 solo and 22 assisted, as well as one tackle for a loss of yards and one forced fumble. Turner, at middle linebacker, recorded 61 tackles, including 43 solo and 18 assisted, as well as two sacks, seven tackles for a loss of yards and one forced fumble. A three-year starter who has led the team in tackles two years, he battled an injured back all year but is hoping to stay healthy this year.

"We will look to our returning starters to step up and lead us in the right direction," Carlson said. "It is their responsibility to set the tone for the team no only on Friday nights but to uphold our standards throughout each week."

Projected to join the offensive starting lineup are sophomore Shawn Mautz at quarterback, sophomore Talis Sharpe at wide receiver and sophomore Lane Warkentine at right guard.

Projected to join the defensive starting lineup are Kitt at left tackle and junior Tegan Smith at defensive end.

"We will have a handful of underclassmen earning starting roles," Carlson said. "They'll need to consistently grow and get better each week."

The Wildcats have one main goal this season.

"The main focus will be to find our identity early and improve each week to play our best football come playoff time," Carlson said.

The Wildcats will kick off their season with a game against Santa Fe Trail at Carbondale 7 p.m. Friday, Sept. 5.

HARTFORD — The Hartford High School Lady Jaguar volleyball team is welcoming a new head coach this season but will have some familiar faces on the court.

Leo Sheahan will be the Lady Jaguars head coach this season. This is Sheahan's first season as a head coach. He will be assisted by Brittany Barrett.

On the court, the Lady Jaguars return four starters to their lineup. They include seniors Aubrey Finnerty and Sydney Sull, junior Jade Wilson and sophomore Lauryn Finnerty. Aubrey Finnerty is an outside and middle hitter. Sull is the team's libero. Wilson is a setter and defensive specialist. Lauryn Finnerty is a setter and right side hitter.

"Aubrey, a four-year varsity athlete and now a senior, has established herself as a powerful hitter and a strong leader on the court," Sheahan said. "Sydney, also a four-year varsity senior, anchors the defense as libero. Her consistency in serve receive and digging has been invaluable, and she has embraced a leadership role by mentoring younger athletes in passing and serve receive. Jade is a smart setter who also brings consistency in the back row. Her ability

to read the court and distribute the ball effectively makes her a key playmaker for the team. Lauryn made an immediate impact as a freshman on varsity and continues to excel in both hitting and setting, contributing versatility and reliability to the lineup."

Joining the returning starters are Keighly Giesken-Mears and Mylee Giesken-Mears.

"Keighly has quickly established herself at the net and will be one of our most consistent blockers this season," Sheahan said. "Mylee, despite not playing last year, has brought stability to our back row with her passing and has stepped up to contribute as an outside hitter, as well."

The team's goals for this season are to achieve a winning record, maintain a team passing average about 2.0, record 12 or more kills per set, limit dropped balls to fewer than two per match an serve with more than 90 percent accuracy.

"Another key goal is to raise our team's volleyball IQ, which is developing the ability to read the court and make smarter decisions about ball placement," Sheahan said. "We are also focused on shaping a stronger team culture, one

"Graduation hit our team hard," Windle said. "Cody Cleveland, Oliver Smith and Samuel Blankley all have competed at the




state meet at least once, with Cody having competed twice, and they have all moved on to either the military or college. We only have one high school runner this year, and three junior high runners."

# **Ball control, decision making** to be key for Lady Wolves

LEBO — After a 2024 season in which they went 43-4 and finished as Class 1A Division II State Runner-up, the Lebo Lady Wolves are entering a new season in which ball control and decision making will be key to their success.

The Lady Wolves, coached by returning head coach Gina Peek and assistant coach Tiffany Tastove-Rosine, will have to do some rebuilding, as they lost to graduation several seniors including Saige Hadley, Siara Crouch and Abi Jones, who all earned multiple postseason honors.

Only three starters from the 2024 team return, seniors Ally Peek and Allison Konrade and junior Rachael Barnhardt. Peek is a setter and outside hitter and earned a Lyon County League All-League Second Team selection her junior season. Konrade is an outside hitter, middle blocker and setter, while Barnhard is an outside hitter and middle blocker.

"We have a lot of team speed and playmakers," Hadley said. "We have been able to make the second or third round of the playoffs the last four years and gained much-needed experience in big games."


Potential weaknesses include overall youth and needing to replace the six graduated seniors.
