



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

While he has enjoyed his time in 4-H, Stukey said he has also learned multiple lessons.


"Being in 4-H has taught me a lot about hard work, earning what I want to get and planning for the future," Stukey said.

Vogts' favorite memory of 4-H is



be handed out.

Registration will take place from 5 to 5:45 p.m. in front of St. Francis Xavier Parish Hall, and participants should line up at the east side of Third and Juniatta streets. Participants are asked to refrain from traveling down U.S. 75 with their entries and to observe the safety and welfare of all others in the formation of the parade.

Cash prizes will be awarded to the top four floats, with first place receiving \$200. The second-place prize is \$150, while the third-place float receives \$100 and the fourth-place finisher wins \$50. The first-, second- and third-place business floats will receive prizes of \$50, \$40 and \$30, respectively. All other floats entered will receive \$20. Winners in all other categories will receive \$20 for first place, \$10 for second place and \$5 for third place. Prize money may be collected from 2:30 to 4 p.m. Sunday, July 27, at Kelley Hall at the fairgrounds.

Parade categories include classic car/pickup, modified car/ pickup, oldest driven car/pickup, oldest tractor, most rare tractor, oldest person in parade, oddities, business floats, floats and horse/ mule with rider.

As a 4-Her, Vogts has learned a variety of lessons and life skills.

"4-H has provided me with many valuable lessons that have and will greatly impact my life," Vogts said. "Learning not to give up when things don't go as planned with a project or when showing an animal. We were taught that if you started something to see it all the way through, right down to the paperwork (for a record book). Time management, responsibility to commitments and good communication are a few skills that I developed during my career and that I will continue to build on."

Community service also provided learning opportunities.

"Community service projects showed me that, no matter the age, everyone can help others," Vogts said.

Perhaps the most significant impact of 4-H was learning leader-ship.



# **2025** Sweet 6 and Sweet 16 Contest


### **Burlington Jaynes** sponsoring annual fundraising contest

The nine Sweet 6 contestants and seven Sweet 16 contenders will ride on a float in the fair parade at 6 p.m. on Friday, July 25. The winner in each category will be crowned after the parade at the grandstand in Kelley Park.The winner is determined by the largest number of votes, with one penny equal to one vote. Contestants have a collection box and picture displayed at Hoover's Thriftway in Burlington. Girls must

be present at the crowning ceremony to win. Votes may be cast at Hoover's until noon July 25. At that time, the collection boxes will be picked up by the Burlington Javnes. The Sweet 6 and Sweet 16 contest is a fundraising project sponsored by the Burlington Jaynes, a community service organization. The Jaynes use money collected from the contest to support many community events and projects. The events and projects for which funds have been utilized vary and include Burlington's annual Easter Egg Hunt, scholarships for graduating seniors, adopting families at Thanksgiving and Christmas, playground improvements and community youth events. The Burlington Jaynes have sponsored the Sweet 6 and Sweet 16 contest since 1973.
