


John Wayne Norman

(March 9, 1932-Jan. 8, 2020)

WAVERLY — John Wayne Norman, Waverly, died the afternoon of Wednesday, Jan. 8, 2020, at his home. He was 87.

He was born March 9, 1932, in his family home six miles south of Waverly. He was the only son of John and Olive Fern (Kukuk) Norman.

John Wayne described himself as "strictly a country boy". With the exception of his military service, he lived and farmed in rural Waverly his entire life. He graduated from Waverly High School with the class of 1949. He served in the U.S. Army from January 15, 1953 to December 24, 1954. He was a veteran of the Korean War.

John Wayne married Roberta Ann Keys May 15, 1955, at the Burlington Methodist Church, in Burlington. He was surrounded by girls with the birth of three daughters, Laurie (Steve) Stewart, Lenexa, Sandra (Jack) Salava, Manhattan, and Gaye (Johnnie) Jarred, Claremore, Okla. John Wayne eventually got some boys with his sons-in-law and the birth of four grandsons plus one granddaughter: Jesse Jarred (Marissa), John Michael Jarred

(Natalie), Jordan Salava, Justin Jarred, and Sara Salava Bower (Craig). He was a blessed with four grandchildren, Mara, Mali, Mava and Rhett Jarred. He loved having family members come to the farm to play and visit.

During his lifetime, John Wayne was active in the community with service to Rural Water District #3, Coffey County Farm Bureau, Extension and Fair Boards. He participated in the Coffey County Saddle Club and became horse superintendent for the annual Coffey County Fair when his father retired from that position. John Wayne enjoyed dancing and was a member of the Waverly Wranglers Square Dance Club. Following their square-dancing period, he and Roberta often traveled to Altoona to dance. He nev-

er turned down a chance to dance or go casino gambling. Football and basketball seasons found him watching, listening, and chair side coaching players on television. He was honored to participate in the 12th Southern Coffey County Honor Flight to Washington, D.C., in April of 2017. Following his cancer diagnosis, he attended Coffey County Cancer Support Group meetings and truly appreciated the caring support of this group in addition to the staff from Hand in Hand Hospice.

His parents preceded him in death as did one sister, Adelia Ritchey. He had three surviving sisters, Evelyn Kimmell, Iva Bowen and Audrey Keith.

As to his wishes, John Wayne was cremated. Memorial services were 2 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 14, at Jones Funeral Home, Burlington. Inurnment will take place later in the Glendale Cemetery.

January is Stalking Awareness Month

Stalking is a crime

EMPORIA — SOS, Inc. recognizes Stalking Awareness Month in January and is dedicated to increasing awareness about stalking. Stalking is intentionally or recklessly engaging in a course of conduct targeted at a specific person which would cause that person to fear for their or their family member's safety. Stalking is a crime in Kansas. In 2018, Kansas law enforcement agencies received 898 reports of stalking. There were at least 1,601 victims

of stalking who reached out for victim services. In Kansas last year, 5,511 Protection From Stalking orders were requested, and within the six counties that SOS serves (Chase, Coffey, Greenwood, Lyon, Morris and Osage) there were 142 Protection From Stalking orders filed by the court.

Stalkers are often someone known to the victim. In Kansas, stalkers were someone known to the victim in 93 percent of stalking offenses in 2018. Stalking often overlaps with other crimes, including intimate partner violence, domestic violence and sexual

assault. Current or former intimate partners were responsible for 49 percent of stalking offenses in Kansas in 2018.

Stalking can be a dangerous crime. Fifty-four percent of femicide victims in the U.S. reported stalking to the police before they were killed by their stalkers. In 85 percent of completed and 75 percent of attempted femicides in the U.S., there was at least one episode of stalking the year prior.
