

SCC 2-2 against Marmaton Valley, Altoona-Midway

The Southern Coffey County High School basketball teams hosted Marmaton Valley for their winter homecoming games Friday, Feb. 14, after hosting Altoona-Midway Tuesday, Feb. 11. The Titan boys earned their first win of the season against Marmaton Valley, and both SCC teams finished the week 1-1.

The Lady Titans' game against Marmaton Valley was close. They were edged by only two points in the first quarter, but a sluggish second quarter proved costly, as they were topped 12-3. SCC was on the lower end of a 17-6 half-time score. They battled back in the second half, outscoring Marmaton Valley 12-7 in the third quarter, but were unable to complete the comeback, topping Marmaton Valley by only three points in the final quarter. SCC came up short of the win by three points, 34-31.

Bryli Copeland and Reed Szambecki each scored 13 points for SCC. Kyra Ohl added five.

In other stats, Ohl collected eight rebounds, while Copeland caught four and Szambecki, Taryn Lather, Makayli Walters and Josie Weers each took one. Emersyn Hall had five assists, Copeland had four and Walters had two. Copeland made five steals, Ohl made four and Szambecki made one.

Against Altoona-Midway, the Lady Titans built a seven-point lead in the first quarter and expanded it to eight in the second. SCC led Altoona-Midway 24-16 at halftime. The Lady Titans went on to outscore Altoona-Midway by 11 points in the third quarter and three in the fourth. SCC won, 50-28.

Szambecki was the game's top scorer with 26 points for SCC. Weers chipped in eight points and Copeland added seven.

In other stats, Ohl pulled down 10 rebounds, while Szambecki collected eight and Weers and Hall each caught six. Hall and Copeland each had six assists and Weers had two. Copeland made six steals, Walters made four and Weers made three.

In the boys' game against Marmaton Valley, the Titans took the lead early and, determined to find victory for the first time this season, held on tight. They won, 63-35. SCC fell to Altoona-Midway, 53-41. Box scores for the two boys' games were not available at press time.

The Titans and Lady Titans played at Uniontown Monday, Feb. 17. They will bring their regular season to a close with games against Lebo Friday, Feb. 21. Games at Lebo will tip off at 5 p.m.

Lebo splits with Burlingame, falls to Lyndon

The Lebo Wolves and Lady Wolves played at Burlingame Friday, Feb. 14, three days after hosting Lyndon Tuesday, Feb. 11.

The Lady Wolves got into a hole early in the girls' game and were down 13-4 after one quarter. The deficit grew to double digits in the second quarter, leaving Lebo on the short end of a 25-8 score at halftime. Lebo began to battle back in the second half, outscoring Burlingame by three points in the third quarter and four in the fourth. However, they were unable to complete the comeback and dropped the game, 43-33.

Abby Peek led the Lady Wolves' attack with 11 points. Demi Schrader added 10 points, and Alli Moore scored nine.

In the boys' game, the Wolves bounded out to a 10-point lead by the end of the first quarter. Burlingame answered by scoring 10 points to Lebo's four in the second quarter. At halftime, the score stood at 23-19 in favor of Lebo. The Wolves went on to top Burlingame 10-6 in the third quarter and 12-4 in the fourth. Lebo won, 45-29.

Devan McEwen led all scorers with 22 points. Kaden Ott contributed 12 and Kyle Reese finished with seven.

Against Lyndon, both Lebo teams had tough games. The girls trailed 5-3 after the first quarter. The deficit grew an-

other two points in the second quarter, leaving the Lady Wolves on the short end of a 12-8 halftime score. Lebo was outscored by five points in the third quarter and, though they scored more closely with Lyndon in the final quarter, could not overcome the deficit. Lebo fell, 35-25.

The Wolves also got in a small hole early in the boys' game, falling behind 15-12 after one quarter. The two teams scored even in the second quarter, and the score stood a 24-21 in favor of Lyndon at the game's midpoint. Lebo attempted a comeback in the second half. They topped Lyndon 11-6 in the third quarter to claim a 32-30 lead with one quarter left. However, Lyndon answered back with 12 points to Lebo's six in the final quarter. The Wolves fell, 42-38.

Devan McEwen led Lebo's effort with a game-high 21 points. Kaden Ott contributed 12 points and Jonas Konrade finished with three.

In other stats, Ott pulled down seven rebounds, McEwen collected five and Konrade, Landon Grimmer and Avery Peek each grabbed two. McEwen made two steals and Andrew Bailey and Kyle Reese each made one. Grimmer had two assists and McEwen

and Jerome Ferguson each had one. Ott had the team's only blocked shot.

Waverly teams 3-3 in three outings

Megan Foster hits 1000th career point

The Waverly High School basketball teams hosted Kansas City East Christian Academy Monday, Feb. 17. The Bulldogs and Lady Bulldogs also hosted Chase County Friday, Feb. 14, and took on Central Heights at Richmond Tuesday, Feb. 11. In total, the Waverly teams went 3-3 in the three outings, splitting with KC East Christian Academy, falling to Chase County and sweeping Central Heights.

The Lady Bulldogs picked up a big win over KC East Christian Academy, 78-44. During the game, Waverly senior Megan Foster scored her 1000th career point. She hit the milestone with her final basket in the game. She also broke her personal record for points in a game, scoring 34, and set a new school record for most three-pointers in a game, hitting seven. Teammate Sara McWilliams, a junior, also had a big game for Waverly, finishing with 17 points. A full box score for the game was not available at press time.

In the boys' game, the Bulldogs got into a hole early and were down 21-11 going into the second quarter. They responded to the deficit and erased most of it in the second quarter, trailing 32-30 at the half. However, KC East Christian Academy found momentum in the second half and pulled away. They outscored Waverly by four points in the third quarter and nine in the fourth, and the Bulldogs fell, 73-58. Waverly coach Tyler Williams' thought on the game was simple.

"They shot us out of the gym in the second half," Wil-

liams said. Damian Foster put up 23 points to lead the Bulldogs in scoring. Jolon Lacey contributed 18 points and Wes Patterson added eight.

In other stats, Lacey recorded a double-double, pulling down 12 rebounds. Foster caught seven and Patterson and Christian Decker each collected four. Lacey had five assists, while Patterson had four and Logan Pyle had three. Foster made two steals and Patterson and Pyle each made one. Lacey was credited with all of the team's three blocks.

The Lady Bulldogs came up short against Chase County, 54-42. A box score was not available at press time.

The boys' game was even closer. Waverly had a two-

point lead after the first quarter. It was cut to one point at halftime, when the Bulldogs led, 23-22. In the third quarter, the remainder of Waverly's lead was erased and the two teams were tied 39-39 with one quarter remaining. Waverly was edged in the fourth quarter and fell, 53-50.

"We had a 10-point lead in the second quarter that we squandered through passive defense and out of control offense, taking a one-point lead into the half," Waverly coach Tyler Williams said. "In the second half, it was back and forth, and they made more plays than us."

Lacey led the Bulldogs' effort with 19 points. Patterson

Lady Jaguars win pair, Jaguars fall

The Hartford High School basketball teams were in action twice this past week, hosting Lyndon for their King and Queen of Courts games Friday, Feb. 14, after playing Crest at Colony Tuesday, Feb. 11.

The Lady Jaguars played a close game with Lyndon through the first half. They held a narrow, one-point lead after one quarter but saw it evaporate in the second quarter. Hartford trailed, 17-15, at the game's midpoint. The Lady Jaguars found momentum in the second half and topped Lyndon by four points in the third quarter and nine in the fourth to win, 36-26.

Bailey Darbyshire scored a game-high 17 points for Hartford. Brooke Finnerty put up eight points and Kiernan Breshears had seven.

In the boys' game, the Jaguars trailed early, falling behind 21-16 by the end of the first quarter. They were edged by four points in the second quarter and were down 34-25 at the half.
