### Council opens swimming pool to public

LEBO — Lebo City Council met in special session on Monday, June 22, regarding the opening of the swimming pool at noon on Monday, June 22. The city plans to have the pool open through Labor Day weekend. The pool will have routine cleaning and staff will be required to have their temperature taken each time they work. Pool hours will be noon to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 1 to 7 p.m. on Sundays. Only prepackaged

candy and pop will be served at the concession stand. There will be no rental of pool toys this year. There will be no swim team and no swim lessons taught. Fees will be \$2 each time a person comes to the pool. Children under five years can swim free with an admission paying adult. A book of 10 coupons can be purchased for \$15. Family passes this year will be \$40 for one person, \$60 for two persons, and \$100 for three persons, and \$120 for four or more people on one pass. The passes are reduced in cost compared to 2019 be-

cause of the shortened swim season. Wages will be the same as 2019. Sydney Sullivan will be the pool manager at \$10.50. Assistant manager will be 50 cents an hour above lifeguard pay. First-year guards will be \$7 an hour. Additional years worked will be an additional 25 cents an hour to base pay. Water safety instructor will be an additional 50 cents an hour. Parties may be scheduled 6 to 8 p.m. for \$75. The council approved spending \$2,000 to improve the track at the football field. Most of the improvements will be done to

the east and south sides. The monies for this project will come from the money labeled Coffey County Park and Recreation Funds. The council approved Sherry VanArsdale using the Community Building free of charge to teach a class to benefit community health from 5 to 6 p.m. on Monday and Wednesdays. Mayor Larry Boden presided over the meeting, which included Jamie Jasnoski, Jim Jones and Jerry Julian. Also present was Superintendent of Streets and Utilities Gary Knight and City Clerk Carrie Sloan.

### Quarry accident kills Emporian

The Osage County Sheriff's Office responded to a 911 call 2:29 p.m. Friday, June 19, reporting an accident at Harshman Construction Rock Quarry, 32306 S. California Road, near Melvern. Osage County deputies, Osage County Fire District

No. 3, and Osage County EMS responded to the scene. Upon arrival, it was discovered that Frank J. Rockers Jr., 68, Emporia, had been taking samples at the base of a large chat pile when the pile gave way, burying him. The accident was witnessed

by two workers who immediately began recovery efforts to reach Rockers. Fire units also began rescue efforts upon arrival. Rockers was eventually removed and was pronounced dead.

### Cycle fatality near Pomona Lake

The Kansas Highway Patrol responded to an accident 2:10 p.m. Saturday, June 20, at the junction of K-268 and K-368 highways, where a motorcycle collided with a truck, killing Bryan Thomas Holland, 49, Ottawa. His passenger, Stacy L. Holland, 48, Ottawa, was taken to Stor-

mont-Vail Hospital, Topeka, with life-threatening injuries. According to the Kansas Highway Patrol crash log, Bryan Holland was westbound on K-268 driving a 1993 Yamaha motorcycle. A 1995 Ford F150, driven by Arthur C. Hogelin, 72, Vassar, was

stopped at the intersection on K-268 westbound waiting to turn south on K-368. For unknown reasons, the motorcycle struck the back of the truck. Hogelin was wearing a seat belt and was not injured. Terry's Service removed the motorcycle.

TOPEKA — Richard Phillip Coopman, Waverly, died Friday, June 19, 2020, at Stormont-Vail Hospital, Topeka. He was 83. He died from complications of many long-term health issues.
