Area KU students earn degrees

LAWRENCE — The names of more than 4,700 graduates from the University of Kansas this spring have been announced by the University Registrar.

Many spring and summer 2020 graduates celebrated their accomplishments as part of the virtual 2020 Commencement. Names of summer 2020 graduates will be published in the fall, and not all graduates elect to have their names published by KU News Service.

The university is planning an in-person commencement event in May 2021 for the Class of 2020.

TOPEKA — The Kansas State High School Activities Association Board of Directors voted to approve an optional alternative fall season for those schools which are unable to offer opportunities for student-athletes during the traditional fall season. This does not disrupt those schools which are offering practice and competitions at this time. It does provide an option for schools whose seasons are now, or later, unable to continue.

The plan was approved by the Board with 45 in favor and 29 opposed. This plan effectively provides:

- ✓ An opportunity for student-athletes to participate

in their fall activity that is suspended for the traditional fall months;

- ✓ Allows those schools with more favorable conditions to continue to practice/play;

- ✓ Allows for individual schools to evaluate and decide best course of action for their respective activities;

- ✓ Allows for flexibility at the activity specific level as some activities may continue and while others are suspended (only those suspended would be eligible for the alternative fall season);

- ✓ Schools have been placed into bands (groupings) according to their classification for the purpose of determining appropriate spring sport start dates;

- ✓ Maximum for total number of weeks participating and number of contests (traditional and alternative fall seasons) is congruent to max allowed in traditional fall season;

- ✓ In the band of schools in Classes 1A-4A (amended from published agenda), if more than half of the total suspend one or more activities for the season, the spring sport season would have a delayed start and a later conclusion;

- ✓ In the band of schools in Classes 5A-6A (amended from published agenda), if more than half of the to-

tal schools suspend one or more activities for the season, the spring sport season would have a delayed start and a later conclusion;

- ✓ In each band, the spring season will start on time and conclude on time if less than half of the schools need to utilize the alternative fall season;

sistent with their conservation goals. Hunting and fishing are not allowed on all refuges, but the Service makes every effort to permit them where possible and compatible.

Hunting and fishing generate millions of dollars in revenue for states each year from the sale of licenses and tags. Additionally, excise taxes on firearms and ammunition, as well as sport fishing equipment and boating fuel, generate more revenue for states for wildlife management and public recreation; in 2020 alone the Service will distribute nearly \$1 billion to states under the Wildlife

and Sport Fish Restoration Program.

Marais des Cygnes National Wildlife Refuge will open crow, badger, bobcat, fox, furbearer, opossum, raccoon, striped skunk and coyote on acres already open to hunting, and expand access for all other species on the refuge by removing permit requirements, and Quivira National Wildlife Refuge will open crow, badger, beaver, coyote, fox, opossum, raccoon, skunk, furbearer, turkey, white-tailed deer and mule deer hunting on acres already open to other hunting.

Driver's ed programs can get grants

A new Driver Education Reimbursement Grant Program has been established to provide financial assistance to driver's education programs to help individuals who may not have been able to participate otherwise. The program is part of the Eisenhower Legacy Transportation Program (IKE) passed by the Kansas Legislature this spring.

"Young drivers are over-represented in traffic crashes," said Secretary Julie Lorenz. "This new IKE program provides increased resources to driver education programs so they can train new Kansas drivers to navigate roadways in a safer manner."

The driver education provider will be reimbursed up to \$200 per eligible student who completes the program. Some of the eligibility requirements are that the provider must have an approved driver education program or driver training school, maintain records on students for at least five years and certify all students meet the guidelines.

Students must be between the ages of 14 and 29 and a resident of Kansas; has not had their driving privilege suspended in any way; demonstrate financial need; and can obtain a certificate of completion by the instructor.

"Driver's education has changed a lot over the years, and it is important for young drivers to be able to get to work and other places safely," said Senator Carolyn McGinn. "This program can help them gain driving experience and skills."
