## Cleanup week set, city to upgrade 72 meters

WAVERLY — Members of the Waverly City Council discussed the city's city-wide cleanup set for Oct. 12 through Oct. 17, and approved the purchase of 72 meter registers from Winwater, Olathe, when it met in regular session Sept. 9. Cleanup dates will coincide with the county-wide cleanup week observed by Coffey County. That week, waste will be accepted from citizens at the landfill from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at no charge. The Waverly council expects citizens to take all hazardous materials such as old paint cans, oil and gas cans and batteries, along with other items to the county landfill. Tires will be accepted but will require a fee.

As part of the Waverly city-wide clean up, Steve Dinkle will pick up items such as appliances, iron, sheet metal, bicycles, wagons, sinks, tubs and toilets that citizens leave in a side-by-side manner near the curb of their home. Citizens are to take limbs to the city burn site.

Republic Trash Service will make regular weekly trash pickup in the poly carts on Oct. 13. As always, citizens can leave one large item near the poly cart for pickup. It is possible that the city will be able to make arrangements for Republican Trash Service to pick up more than one large item the week of the cleanup. Questions on the cleanup can be answered by calling (785) 733-2461.

Waverly Mayor Jake Marsh led the council which included Jerry Collins, Taylor Everhart, Kevin McMillen, Nicole Rasmussen, and Tammy White. Also attending were Maintenance Superintendent Travis Vogts, Treasurer Mary Collins and Clerk Anna Keena.

The purchase of meter registers, at a cost of \$12,240, will bring meters up to date, improve accuracy in reading meters, and save about 2.5 hours each month in time spent reading meters.

Gregg Clarkson talked to the council about purchase of the vacant property on the west side of Pearson Street in the downtown area. He

is looking for a possible site for constructing a multi-use building.

Jackie Clarkson asked about fall decorating of the city and city-wide cleanup.

The council reviewed bids from companies for repairs needed to correct damage done during summer storms, approving a bid by GR Roofing, Lyndon, to remove and replace the rolled roofing at 308 Pearson Street for \$17,550.13. In a separate motion, the council accepted the \$5,200 bid by Alpha Roofing, Lawrence, to repair the roof of the building at the city swimming pool, 901 Dane Street.

The city is working with the State of Kansas to replace a culvert at Tenth and Pearson streets.

The council approved opting out of the Aug. 8, 2020, payroll option which was related to COVID-19.

Richard and Amy Lira, owners of a new business, Timeout Bar and Grill, located at 414 Pearson, were present to hear the council approve a cereal malt beverage license for curbside service for the business. In a separate motion, councilmembers approved a zoning permit for a 384 square-foot QSI self-standing garage at 414 Pearson. The building is to serve as an enclosed pavilion for the business.

In other business, the board:

- approved zoning permits for Michael Hirt, 407 Kelley, with 301 Kelley being a more accurate address, for a 1,800 square-foot wood frame/metal building with a concrete foundation; William Ralph Jr., 2029 27th Road, for a 2,400 square-foot metal garage; and Patty Pegram to build a 22x10 wooden front porch at 404 Schofield Street.

- discussed the property at 106 N. Kelly which has been assessed \$650 in mowing fees over several years. No action was taken.

- discussed the segment of street from Seventh to Eighth over to Pearson and how to name that street, with no decision made.

- approved bills totaling \$35,604.07 and payroll of \$15,452.13.

- set a special meeting for 6:30 p.m. Sept. 17, where they made plans to create a touchless entry into buildings owned by the city, including purchase of toilets, sinks and soap dispensers, at a cost of \$54,850, with funds from the CARES Act.
